Aims

Our fundamental aim at Folksworth C of E Primary School is to provide the best possible education for all our pupils. It is our aim to provide a creative and stimulating curriculum through which children develop to their full potential and are inspired with a love of learning.

It is the aim of the school to place a high value on diversity, treating every member of the school community as an individual, and meeting the needs of all, taking account of gender, ethnicity, culture, religion, language, sexual orientation, age ability, disability and social circumstances.

Collective Worship at Folksworth C of E Primary School is identifiably Christian, providing opportunities for members of the school to explore their beliefs and develop a sense of awe, wonder and mystery as part of their spiritual development. There is a close relationship between spiritual and moral development.

Through our daily act of Collective Worship we aim to:

- provide an opportunity for the children to reflect upon and appreciate their worth and value to God, and to the community;
- help children discover their place in the world;
- highlight and nurture the spiritual dimension through experiencing worship;
- provide children with a vocabulary of worship and an experience of its variety of forms;
- provide an opportunity to celebrate Christian festivals;
- heighten awareness of the ultimate questions/realities of life and to provide the opportunity to reflect upon these;
- enable children to make effective use of silence in opportunities for reflection, contemplation, meditation and prayer;
- establish and reinforce the common Christian values of the school community such as love, peace, kindness and compassion;
- promote a feeling of community in the school through a sharing of experiences and feelings;
- provide an opportunity to empathise with the needs, feelings and experiences of others:
- provide an opportunity for children to become acquainted with people from the local and wider community, particularly the church;
- encourage respect and care for God's creation by a positive attitude to both local and global environmental issues;
- foster feelings such as awe, wonder, thankfulness, mystery and joy;
- give memorable and enjoyable experiences;
- provide an opportunity to bring before God in prayer personal needs and those of others.

Entitlement to Worship

Every child is entitled to a daily act of Collective Worship. However, parents have the right to withdraw their child from acts of Collective Worship on religious grounds. Notification of this should be sent to the Headteacher in writing. An adult will supervise any child withdrawn from Collective Worship.

Implementation

Collective Worship includes whole school acts led by the Headteacher, Class teachers and the Vicar of our Parish (or his representative). The participation of the children is encouraged through a range of activities in any given act of worship.

The timetable for Collective Worship is generally as follows:

- The whole school walks together to St Helen's Church for Collective Worship once each term.
- In addition to Collective Worship on a Friday we hold a 'Celebration Assembly' to recognise God's gifts through the sharing of individual and group achievements.

- When planning Collective Worship, consideration is given to balancing the overall programme of worship experiences. This ensures a variety of music, singing, reflection, story, Bible readings and prayer.
- Children are expected to enter and leave Collective Worship in a quiet and reflective manner. Music is played when entering and leaving the hall to enhance the occasion.
- The room is prepared for Collective Worship through the use of a lighted candle or object for reflection.
- We have displays and Christian signs and symbols around the hall.
- The school prayer is displayed and said during times of Collective Worship.
- Children evaluate Collective Worship through discussion and feedback.
- From time to time visitors are invited to lead Collective Worship. These take two forms:
 - o as part of the planned programme for Collective Worship
 - as an occasional act which does not necessarily form part of the programme for Collective Worship but nevertheless provides a positive input to the worshiping community
- Our Foundation Governors take a keen interest in the worship of the school community through participation and attendance at various times during the school and liturgical year.
- Parents and other members of the community are invited to attend our special celebrations including at Harvest, Christmas and Easter.
- Each half term children in Year 1 Year 6 take it in turns to plan and lead collective worship around a chosen theme.

Monitoring, Evaluation and Review

Collective Worship is monitored in a range of ways. These include:

- Questionnaires to children and parents relating to all aspects of Collective Worship.
- Foundation Governor visits to the school to see Collective Worship and report to the Governing Body.
- Informal feedback from children after times of Collective Worship

Findings from all of these are looked at by children, staff and Governors and changes made as necessary.

This policy is reviewed every two years.
